## Memories (part 2 of 6) - originally written in 2009 by the Baileys



On the SE corner of Albert, at 1398 Edmund was Cournoyer's, another corner store. The owner had cats running around in her store. One time my brother had to use the bathroom and it was in the basement. When he went down there he found large metal signs that said Lucky Strike Green has gone off to war. There were about 30-40 of them. Another time the owner asked my brother if he had seen her son's car and when he said no, she took him to the garage, opened it and under a tarp was a 1940 Chevrolet. She said her son had bought it brand new and she was holding it for him until he came back so my

brother asked her when he was coming back and she said he went off to war and he was buried in Belgium. He asked her if she wanted him to get rid of the car and she said, "No, I told my son I'd hold on to it until he came back."

As we go one block further we come to 569 Pascal. This was home to The Quality Dairy Store that dated back to the 1920's. I don't remember our ever shopping there as we had a store only one block from our house.



We now head north 2 blocks to Lafond and east to Albert where we come to Wilson High School, I was looking forward to going to Wilson. Both of my older brothers had graduated from there and practically everyone in our eighth grade class from Galtier would be there too. Well, we were there for two years and then they changed Wilson back to a Junior High. It had been a Junior High School before World War II and they changed it to a high school. Now they were changing

it back again and we would have to go to Central High School for the remaining two years. I was mad. I didn't want to learn a new school song and have new school colors and I didn't want to cheer for a team who were arch-rivals for many years. But we had to go and Central was so large. Certain staircases were up only and others were down to accommodate all the kids. Our class was one of the largest ever graduated so they used the downtown auditorium and had to call us up two by two so it didn't last hours and hours. It sure didn't have the charm of Wilson.

The building at 1340 Thomas, at the SW corner of Hamline, and its neighboring stores have gone through some changes and been home to a wide variety of businesses over the years.



Cecil's Fruit Stand used to be in another building that was attached to the west side of the 2 story building that is currently there. It was a one



story building with no basement. You can see where the building was by the patterns on the sidewalk and you could also see it on the side of the building until it was covered over by a mural in 2009. To the west of Cecil's was a small empty lot. When Cecil's was torn down, they expanded the lot next door to full size, incorporating Cecil's land, and moved a house onto it from the

Northern Pacific Hospital area which, by that time, had become Good Samaritan Hospital.

- **Meals/Groceries:** Many grocery stores offer special hours for seniors to shop. Food shelves, Ramsey Cty Sheriff and Metro Mobility are offering food delivery. Call HME for details.
  - Zion Lutheran Church serves to-go meals and a bag of groceries on Thursdays from 12:15-2:00. Delivery may be arranged for seniors in our service area.
  - Midway YMCA offers a free meal package for four, 12 - 1pm Monday through Friday. Also, lunch bags with a sandwich, snacks and fruit are available.

- **2019 Tax Return** Filing Deadline has been extended to July 15, 2020.
- **Economic Impact (Stimulus) Payments** were sent to many Americans. If you have questions or need help to check the status with the IRS, please contact our office.

# We Need Your Help: Respond to the Census



A reminder to respond to the 2020 census that was mailed to you back in March. Expect the census to look different than in the past as this is the first census with an option to respond electronically.

Most people in the Twin Cities Metro will not initially receive a paper census form. The mailing that you receive will give instructions for responding to the census online or via phone. If you do not easily have access to respond online, you can follow the instructions to respond by phone. If you did not respond by April, you should have received a paper form to mail in.

Responses to the 2020 Census will influence funding in our community for services that help every generation. It is especially important to get a complete count of people 65 + as that affects funding for services to help people stay living at home. Missing just one person in the census will result in loss of over \$27,000 of federal funding to Minnesota over the 10 years until the next census.

Meals on Wheels in our neighborhood is provided through Keystone Community services. Meals can be fresh, frozen, or hot; delivered one or several days at a time; vegetarian, low sodium, low fat, diabetic, kosher, pureed, gluten free and lactose free. Open to all ages, short-term or long-term.

Meals on Wheels can be a great help to people who need easy and healthy meals for a variety of reasons, for example, recovering from surgery or illness. Sometimes people with memory or attention issues don't eat well independently, but a fresh meal arriving at the door can be a good reminder to eat.


